


John and his Toy Trucks

Breaking the Age Code



What we're reading now: This book by Yale professor and expert on the psychology of successful aging, Dr. Becca Levy, draws on her research to show how we can improve our age beliefs to benefit our aging process--including the way genes operate and the extension of life expectancy by 7.5 years.

Some chapters: "Old and Fast", "Ageism: The Evil Octopus"; "Brawny Brains: Genes Aren't Destiny", and "Stars Invisible by Day: Creativity and the Senses".

You can find Dr. Levy discussing this on many podcasts, if you prefer to listen to her speak on the subject. Search her name wherever you get your podcasts. (Make sure you get the name of the book correct -- on Amazon, the word "Code" appears in books about gene editing, WWII women code-breakers, Alan Turing, and the Book of Revelations.)
